

Labour Court Privacy Statement

Privacy and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)

The Labour Court fully respects your right to privacy, and will not collect any personal information about you on this website without your clear permission. Any personal information which you provide to the Labour Court will be treated with the highest standards of security and confidentiality, strictly in accordance with the Data Protection Acts 1988-2018 and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) (EU) 2016/679 is a regulation on data protection and privacy for all individuals within the European Union. It came into force across the European Union on 25 May 2018. It replaces the previous data protection directive which has been in force since 1995 and forms the basis of our new Data Protection Irish laws (Data Protection Acts 1988-2018).

Collection and use of personal information

The Labour Court does not collect any personal data about you on this website, apart from information which you volunteer (for example by e-mailing us). Any personal information which you provide in this way is not made available to any third parties, save as required by law, and is used by the Labour Court only in line with the purpose for which you provided it. You should also note that any personal information which you provide to us by way of completing an application form or provide in another format for any of the services we administer will only be used by us for the purpose(s) for which you provided it.

Sharing personal information

The Labour Court may share your personal data with other parties as part of its statutory function but only in circumstances where it is lawful to do so. For example, if you submit an appeal to the Labour Court, any information you send to the Labour Court will be copied to the other party. Your personal data will also be shared by the Labour Court in the following circumstances.

Your Representatives

Where you have submitted an appeal and you nominate a representative (such as a trade union, a legal representative or any other person acting for you) your representative will be sent the documentation from the other party to the appeal. This documentation will contain any personal data you have already provided to the Labour Court.

Our People

To carry out its function, the Labour Court may need to share your personal data internally, for example, the Secretariat may exchange appeal details with the Court or a division of the Court or with the Court Registrar. Your personal data will only be shared where there is a lawful basis for the processing.

Our Website

Decisions of the Labour Court, including the names of the parties are published on this website. The Court's list of cases including the names of the parties is also published on this website. This is done in compliance with the Court's statutory function to conduct proceedings in public.

Government Departments, Bodies or Agencies

The Labour Court is obligated by law to share personal data with other State bodies. Recipients of these data may include Government Departments (e.g. the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection) or other Agencies (e.g. the Revenue Commissioners). Personal data will only be shared in compliance with the relevant legislation.

Collection and use of technical information

Technical details in connection with visits to this website are logged by our internet service provider for statistical purposes. No information is collected that could be used by us to identify website visitors. The technical details logged are confined to the following items:

- the IP address of the visitor's web server
- the top-level domain name used (for example .ie, .com, .org, .net)
- clickstream data which shows the traffic of visitors around this web site (for example pages accessed and documents downloaded)
- the type of web browser used by the website visitor.
- the version of the operating system used by the visitor

The Labour Court will make no attempt to identify individual visitors, or to associate the technical details listed above with any individual. It is the policy of the Labour Court never to disclose such technical information in respect of individual website visitors to any third party (apart from our internet service provider, which records such data on our behalf and which is bound by confidentiality provisions in this regard), unless obliged to disclose such information by a rule of law. The technical information will be used only by the Labour Court, and only for statistical and other administrative purposes. You should note that technical details, which we cannot associate with any identifiable individual, do not constitute "personal data" for the purposes of the Data Protection Acts 1988-2018.

Cookies

Cookies are small text files which are downloaded to your computer or mobile device when you visit a website or application. Your web browser (such as Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome) then sends these cookies back to the website or application on each subsequent visit so that they can recognise you and remember things like user preferences.
